Historical Sketch

The El Paso *Herald* (forerunner of the *Herald-Post*) was the first English-language paper in the El Paso area. The founders Frank Tew, B.F. Deal and James Baker brought the press in a horse-drawn wagon from Colorado. The first issue of the El Paso *Herald* was believed to be 27 March 1881. It was printed in a rented adobe building at South Campbell Street. Because no copies of this issue survive, there has been debate over whether the *Herald* truly was the "first" paper. The *Times* published its first issue the same day or six days later (depending on the sources consulted). In 1888, the *Herald* became a daily. Between 1881-1929, the *Herald* absorbed 10 other papers.

In 1898, Captain Hugh deCourcy Slater purchased the *Herald*. He purchased the *Times* in 1925. For two years, the papers had one owner but always remained distinct in purpose and staff. H.D. Slater sold both papers in 1929 to separate owners.

In 1931, the *Herald* was sold again. It was joined with the Scripps-Howard afternoon paper, *the Post*. The *Post*, founded in 1922 as a daily, had suffered a rocky start and survived only through the financial backing by E.W. Scripps. Wallace Perry, editor of the *Post*, served as the first editor of the combined newspaper.

The newspaper strongly promoted community issues and championed the underdog. Their slogan was "The Newspaper that Cares about El Paso." E.M. Pooley (1936-63), served as editor for over thirty years and was featured in a 1957 issue of *Time* magazine. He, and the paper, strongly supported political candidate Raymond L. Telles Jr, El Paso's first Hispanic mayor in 1957. Journalist Rubén Salazar also worked for the paper during the fifties before going to the Los Angeles *Times*. The paper's community causes included support of the Scripps-Howard Spelling Bee that has produced 4 national winners. Other newspaper projects included the Literacy Project and the Kids Voting project. Journalistically, the paper remained strong. The newspaper was a finalist in two Pulitzer Prize categories in 1987.

The El Paso *Herald-Post* became the first local paper available online in 1995. Physically, it shared offices with its rival, the *Times*. In 1936, the Newspaper Printing Corporation had formed in order to handle all mechanical aspects of production, in addition to circulation and advertising, for both the *Herald-Post* and the *Times*. This arrangement was the second one of its kind in the United States. Gannett Corporation, which purchased the *Times* 1972, terminated the Joint Operation Agreement 6 October 1997. The final edition of the El Paso *Herald-Post* was published 11 October 1997.

Series Description

Series I. Library File Photos- People, 1951-1996. 795 linear inches (159 boxes)

Arranged in alphabetical order by last name (each name individually foldered). No subseries. Most photos are dated 1986-1993. This collection includes prints and photocopies of Associated Press facsimiles. It includes El Paso natives and visitors to the area, as well as other photos taken by staff photographers. In the case of famous El Paso natives, promotional shots may also be included.

Series II. Library File Photos- Subjects, 1982-1993. 235 linear inches (47 boxes)

Arranged in alphabetical order by name or location. No subseries. Most photos are dated 1985-1993. This series includes prints and photocopies of Associated Press facsimiles, as well as promotional shots. This includes photographs of local events and movies that have been filmed in the area, or include native actors. This series is filed under original story subjects so a particular building or event may be filed under multiple subjects.

Series III. El Paso *Herald-Post*, 1881-1992. 4239 linear inches (4 boxes, 10 filing cabinets)

Arranged in three subseries: Clippings Files, Special Sections and Bound Volumes. The clippings files contain approximately 16,000 envelopes of clippings that appeared in the *Herald-Post*. The filing cabinets contain 8 drawers and are approximately 52 by 15 inches. The remainder of the series is 79 linear inches. The Special Sections contains original series between 1988-1992. The bound volumes contain early editions of the paper.

Series IV. Office Administrative Papers, 1948-1997. 23.5 linear inches (4 boxes)

Arranged in four subseries: Employment Info/ Stylebooks, Historical Files, Editors Papers and Employee Files. In the Employment/Info series there is a 1948 Scripps Howard book, but all other materials are dated from the 1985-1994. Some material is contained in a 8.5" x 11" box. Historical Files include 3 folders of photographs and clippings from various publications. Editors Papers include correspondence and limited drafts of speeches/editorials.

Series V. Community Activities, 1962-1997. 15.5 linear inches (3 boxes)

Arranged in four subseries: Scripps-Howard Spelling Bee, Newspaper Open House, Kids Voting and Academic Achievement. One box that contains Spelling Bee

material is 5.5" x 6". Spelling Bee material includes programs, word lists and photocopies of articles from the *Herald-Post*. The Kids Voting material includes a folder of editor correspondence, clippings and information about the vote and the corporate board. Individual files contain information on the Open House and Academic Achievement.

Series VI. Portraits/Memorabilia, 1963-1996. 43 linear inches (7 boxes)

Arranged in chronological order of editors. No subseries. Includes framed photographs of 7 editors and plaques presented to the newspapers between 1993-1996. Editor photographs stored in 2 oversize legal boxes. Also includes *Herald* masthead and signage.

Series VII. Library File Negatives, 1981-1996. 370 linear inches (74 boxes)

Arranged in five subseries: Undated, 1981-1986, 1987-1990, 1991-1993, 1994-1996. In the nineties, a few slides are also included. The undated files include Don Haskins photographs and negatives. The Library Photos--Negatives are filed chronologically by month. The collection includes various local events and people, many of whose prints are found either in the people/subject files or in the special editions file.

Scope and Content

The first series, **Library File Photos- People**, contains prints of photographs taken by staff photographers of local residents and illustrious visitors. The majority of photos date from the late eighties (with a few scattered photos before 1980). The collection has no folder numbers, but is arranged alphabetically by the last name (or father's last name for Hispanic names). This collection also contains promotional photos or copies of wire photos that feature El Paso natives or took place in El Paso or Chihuahua, Mexico. Many of the photos are series taken during political campaigns or musical concerts. People with the same name have been filed in the same folder. Occasionally photos have been cut in half, and each half filed under the appropriate name. This series consists of 95 boxes.

The **Library File Photos- Subject** is a much smaller collection but far more difficult to use. Photos in the El Paso (City-Historic) folder include some reprints of 1882 photos, but the bulk of the photos date 1985-1993. This series contains 25 boxes, filed alphabetically according to the original file title. Sometimes a subject may be filed under multiple titles depending on how used in a story. For example, Ysleta Mission, has photos in the "Missions" file, photos in "Ysleta" and in "Ysleta Mission." Also, if a desired subject is not found, and it is an El Paso landmark or agency, look under El Paso, then the appropriate subject name. Some photos of El Paso *Herald-Post* staffers and community activities are filed by subtitle under El Paso *Herald-Post*. Also, promotional photos of movies and television programs about or filmed in El Paso are

filed under subject.

The third series, **El Paso Herald-Post**, consists of material actually taken from issues of the *Herald-Post*. Excluding the clipping drawers, the series has 79 linear inches. The first subseries, the Clippings Files, has 10 file drawers which contain approximately 16,000 clippings which date between 1985-1992. This material, filed by subject, is 4160 linear inches. Sometime in the future, this portion of the collection will be indexed. This material is kept in the offsite storage. The second subseries contains special editions and subject series in the newspaper. There are two 21.5" x 24" and one 19" x 24" boxes- the first two contains 29 special sections filed chronologically between 1987-1994. The third box contains some extra copies of those sections and editions of papers of historical value such as the Persian Gulf War, Kennedy's visit to El Paso and the bicentennial issue (2 of these papers are photocopies, the others are originals). It also contains 2 paper copies of the final issue. Finally, there is a box which contains one volume (19" x 24") of issues of the paper between 1881-1883. Other material from the paper can be found in current periodical microfilms (see also: Related Collections).

The fourth series, **Office Administrative Papers**, deals primarily with materials from the last two editors, Tom King and Georgiana Vines. This collection is fairly eclectic and is 23.5 linear inches. A special feature of this subseries is the clipping and photograph file on the history of the *Herald-Post*. This subseries also includes a folder with responses on the papers shutdown. Two boxes contain policies and stylebooks and manuals for the office. The Editors Papers subseries contains writing files for Wallace Perry, E.M. Pooley and Georgiana Vines. Additionally it contains correspondence for Pooley, Jay Ambrose, Tom King and Vines. This correspondence is divided in Responses (letters written by the editor) and Correspondence (contains a reply and the original letter to the editor). Letters are arranged chronologically within these subdivision. The last three editors also have correspondence files on major projects they sponsored.

The El Paso *Herald-Post* prided itself on its community involvement. The **Community Activities** series contains material on certain projects (15.5 linear inches). The most extensive information is on the Scripps-Howard Spelling Bee (material dating from 1962). The El Paso representative has won the National Spelling Bee twice. There are clippings concerning the winners, and the words and scripts used at local and national spelling bees. The final editor, Georgiana Vines had an extensive involvement with the Kids Voting program in 1996-1997. Her files and scrapbooks have been refoldered to provide both local clippings and information about the running of the program. There is also one file each on Academic Achievement and Open House in Newspaper.

The **Portraits/Memorabilia** series contains ephemeral materials that do not fit easily into other series. This collection contains framed photographs of seven editors, taken from the *Herald-Post* offices and plaques that also hung in the editor's office.

Another box contains a framed photocopy of the earliest known issue and promotional signs. Additionally, this series contains a box with a copy of the final edition of the newspaper, and the plaque that contains an engraving of the final front page. There is also a typewriter, believed to have belonged to one of the newspaper's earliest owners, Hugh deCourcy Slater and a masthead dating from the El Paso *Herald*.

Under **Library Photos- Negatives** are folders of negatives of the assignments of *Herald-Post* photographers. The series is 370 inches, foldered into 74 boxes. In the undated files are those in which the date can only be narrowed to 1980-1996. It also includes negative-print files for Jim Paulie and Don Haskins. Filed chronologically according to the assignment, this series folders by month. Negatives reflect similar subjects to the people and subject series. Undated photos for the year are filed prior to January. There are a few slides, but the majority of the collection consists of negatives. Approximately half have a title on the assignment, but others have only the date so they have been filed chronologically. Approximately half list the photographer. Subject headings at the top of the sheet often duplicate the subject file titles used in the print files

Provenance Statement

The *Herald-Post* published its last issue 11 October 1997. The final editor, Georgiana Vines, contacted the University of Texas at El Paso concerning the disposition of the library and other files. On 15 December 1997, Judith G. Clabes, Editorial Director for E. W. Scripps Company, in Cincinnati, Ohio, signed the deed of gifts.

Literary Rights Statement

The Library holds the rights to the El Paso *Herald-Post* records. Materials used in publications need to cite the *Herald-Post* as source. *Herald-Post* photographs also must be credited whenever they are used or exhibited.

Notes to Researcher

In 1999, Special Collections received the El Paso Herald-Post sports files, which are described separately. In 2001, Special Collections was able to accession the historical files (morgue) from the newspaper's library, including some photograph prints, which will also be described in a separate finding aid.
